Rage and Beyond: Irawati's Gandhari is a retelling of the MAHABHARATA, from the viewpoint of Gandhari, the blindfolded queen. It is inspired by the one of the first contemporary interpretations of the Mahabharata by woman anthropologist Irawati Karve.



"In the reimagining of Irawati's Gandhari in movement, music, and text, I try to keep the pulse of this character as imagined by her author alive in my moving body. I explore her complex and shifting relationship with her blindfold. In doing this, I endeavour to bring alive the violence and contradictions of her inner experience and her various roles as a Kshatriya (warrior caste) woman in the Mahabaharata, who finally moves beyond her physical and metaphorical blindfolds. In my exploration of Irawati's Gandhari, I encounter my own rage, and the blindfolds that we perhaps unconsciously inflict upon our individual and social selves."



Sanjukta Wagh, founder-director of beej, performer, choreographer, teacher and curator, has trained extensively under Rajashree Shirke in Kathak and Pandit Murli Manohar Shukla in Hindustani Music.

An award-winning ICCR empanelled

artiste, her engagement with theatre, her year-long experience at the Trinity Laban Centre of Dance, London, her love of literature and deep unease with comfort zones have led to an interdisciplinary and exploratory mode of work. Sanjukta's dance theatre project, Rage and Beyond: Irawati's Gandhari was nominated in five categories at the National Theatre Awards META, 2015 where she won Best Actor in a Lead role (Female).

Hitesh Dhutia is a freelance guitarist and composer from Mumbai. With a background in Folk, Blues, Rock and Jazz he has developed a distinct sound for each of his collaborations.

He has performed with several artistes live on stage and recorded on multiple studio albums, film projects



and ads. Rage and Beyond: Irawati's Gandhari is his first collaboration with dance-theatre, and won him the national award for best sound design at META, 2015.

Deepa Dharmadhikari is a director and lighting designer. She studied light design at the University of Minnesota-Twin Cities. Her work as a lighting designer has received critical acclaim.
